## **ADVENT 2020: BEING LOVE IN THE WORLD**

Each year as the lovely season of Advent arrives we are invited in a special way to reflect again on the gift of vocation. The primary vocation of each baptized Christian is to live life fully in love, service, witness and holiness. All share in this universal call whatever our particular vocation. The beautiful Vatican 11 document on the Church, *Lumen Gentium* (#40) reminds us: "All the faithful in Christ of whatever rank or status, are called to the fulness of the Christian life and to the perfection of charity."

In the Hebrew Scriptures in the Book of Leviticus (19:2) we read: "Be holy, for I, Yahweh your God am holy."

During Advent, and despite all the premature

Christmas decorations that we see around us, we are gifted with a special time for reflection to examine just what that call to be "holy like God" may look like in our lives. The invitation to take this time; a time of waiting for Christmas is serious. French Archbishop Jean-Louis Brougués, O.P. says: "Every Christian life is an adventure. It begins with the Lord's call at the moment of our baptism. We spend our total existence delving into the meaning of this call: What does the Lord expect of me, and how can I best answer this call?" Advent provides the perfect time to step aside from all the "razzmatazz" of the season in order to respond to these questions in light of the

coming of Christ that we await now and celebrate at Christmas.

The call to be Holy like God! How impossible does that sound? Isn't it all to much, too abstract? Yet, we are reminded in this liturgical season that Christ is the image of the invisible God. His life is our model of God's holiness; holiness that we are each called to imitate. At Christmas we celebrate the incarnation of Christ – Emmanuel, "God with us."

In a homily given in

Manger Square in 2014,

Pope Francis said: "The
Child Jesus, born in
Bethlehem, is the sign
given by God to
those who awaited
salvation, and he
remains forever the
sign of God's tender
ness and presence in our

world." As we contemplate this we remember just how Christ did come, not in greatness with much fanfare, but in simplicity, in poverty, in humility; a vulnerable baby, born of a young mother, fostered by a faith-filled and loving father, Joseph and born in fearful times. His is the pattern of the holiness of God to which we are called. We give thanks for a model that is attainable and that is pure gift of God's presence in our lives, even in fearful times, as we live out our vocation of loving presence in the world.

May this season of Advent not pass us



### **VOCATION CULTURE: REFLECTION TO ACTION**

Although this was a report regarding religious women, it would also be useful for both Canadian men's and women's Religious Congregations to consider.

Back in 2012-2013, the National Religious Vocation
Conference (NRVC) sponsored the *Women Religious Moving Forward in Hope* program underwritten by the
GHR Foundation. They gathered groups of religious
women throughout the USA to explore the opportunities,
challenges and implications for new membership in
Religious life that are presented by the changing ethnic
and generational demographics of Catholic women in the
United States. The concise document arising from these
gatherings identifies critical issues for women's religious
institutes which are:

- a) Establishing boundaries and clear identities as women Religious.
- b) Increasing the cultural knowledge and sensitivity of our members.
- c) Considering how our communal decisions affect younger members.
- d) Increasing the communication among leadership and vocation personnel.
- e) Encouraging all members to be inviters.
- f) Continuing the work of reconciliation and healing within a divided Church.
- g) Working with dioceses and parishes to promote vocations.
- h) Trusting in God's providence.

In the document, there are insightful questions to ponder under each issue which could be very helpful to congregations.

- A. Ten Ways to Build Resilience:
- 1. Make connections.
- 2. Avoid seeing crises as insurmountable problems.
- 3. Accept that change is a part of living.
- 4. Move toward your goals.
- 5. Take decisive action.
- 6. Look for opportunities for self-discovery.
- 7. Nurture a positive view of yourself.
- 8. Keep things in perspective.
- 9. Maintain a hopeful outlook.
- 10. Take care of yourself.
- B. Learning from your Past:
- \* What kinds of events have been most stressful for me?
- How have those events typically affected me?
- Have I found it helpful to think of important people in my life when I am distressed?
- To whom have I reached out for support on working through a traumatic or stressful experience?
- What have I learned about myself and my interactions with others during difficult times?
- \* Has it been helpful for me to assist someone else going through a similar experience?
- \* Have I been able to overcome obstacles, and if so, how?
- \* What has helped me feel more hopeful about the future?
